Read the text called "Nasa", and answer the questions below.

READING TEXT I: NASA

- A.** 90% of Earth-crossing asteroids were detected and catalogued by NASA's planetary protection team in 2010. Any objects within 50 million kilometres of Earth's orbit are considered NEOs, and their magnitude is really staggering. NASA maintains that none of the 887 it is aware of represent a significant danger to Earth, and that there are likely yet 50 more to record.
- B.** Currently, the space agency is concentrating on capturing asteroids that are 140 meters in width or smaller. So yet, only around 8,000 of the estimated 25,000 asteroids of this size have been discovered. These medium-sized asteroids would be a serious hazard if they reached Earth's orbit, as a 19-meter asteroid exploded above the Russian city of Chelyabinsk in 2013, injuring 1,200 people.
- C.** NASA's mission to detect the remaining intermediate-sized NEOs will be successful if funding is obtained for the 0.5-meter space telescope NEO Cam, which would use infrared light to find asteroids. It could possibly complete its task in ten years if given the funding. The planetary defence team must next come up with a plan for fending off the PHAs that threaten Earth the most when they have been noted.
- D.** Rocks that are close enough to Earth's orbit to travel within 7.5 million kilometers of it are considered "Potentially Hazardous Asteroids" (D). With 1,400 PHAs identified, NASA has found that none of them are likely to pose a threat within the next century. With current technology, NASA can track these objects and determine their impact probabilities, at which point two defensive systems may be put into action.
- E.** Double Asteroid Redirection Test is the first. The asteroid Didymos will serve as the testing ground for DART. Didymoon has a diameter of 150 meters and circles a parent body that is 800 meters in diameter; possibly its orbit will be perturbed enough by DART's collision for it to be seen by telescopes on Earth.
- F.** Destroying a PHA on route to Earth with a nuclear weapon is another defensive option. While the plot of the 1998 film Armageddon was inspired by the Hypervelocity Asteroid Mitigation Mission for Emergency Response (HAMMER), this is really a real NASA initiative. For the



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purpose of diverting an approaching asteroid, eight-ton rockets would be fired in its direction. But, if the asteroid was too close to Earth for this plan to work, the rockets would be equipped with nuclear bombs to wipe it out.

READING TEXT II: DRUG ABUSE

Drug abuse is the taking of any substance for any purpose other than the one for which it was intended and in any way that could damage the users' health.
